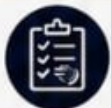

1. Amazon Fires in Brazil Reach Historic Low (2025)

Why in News?

According to **MapBiomas**, fires in **Brazil's Amazon Rainforest** declined to **3.1 million hectares in 2025**, the **lowest since records began in 1985**. The decline is attributed to **reduced deforestation, delayed rains, and stronger conservation efforts**.

About the Amazon Rainforest

Feature	Details
Location	Spans 9 South American countries ; Brazil holds ~60%
Area	~6 million sq. km
Major River	Amazon River (Largest by discharge volume)

Biodiversity	Home to 13% of the world's known species

Ecological Significance

- **World's largest tropical rainforest** and a major **carbon sink**, storing carbon equivalent to **15–20 years of global CO₂ emissions**.
- Generates "**Flying Rivers**" through evapotranspiration, influencing rainfall across South America.
- Regulates the **global carbon and water cycles**.

- Supports rich biodiversity and millions of indigenous people.

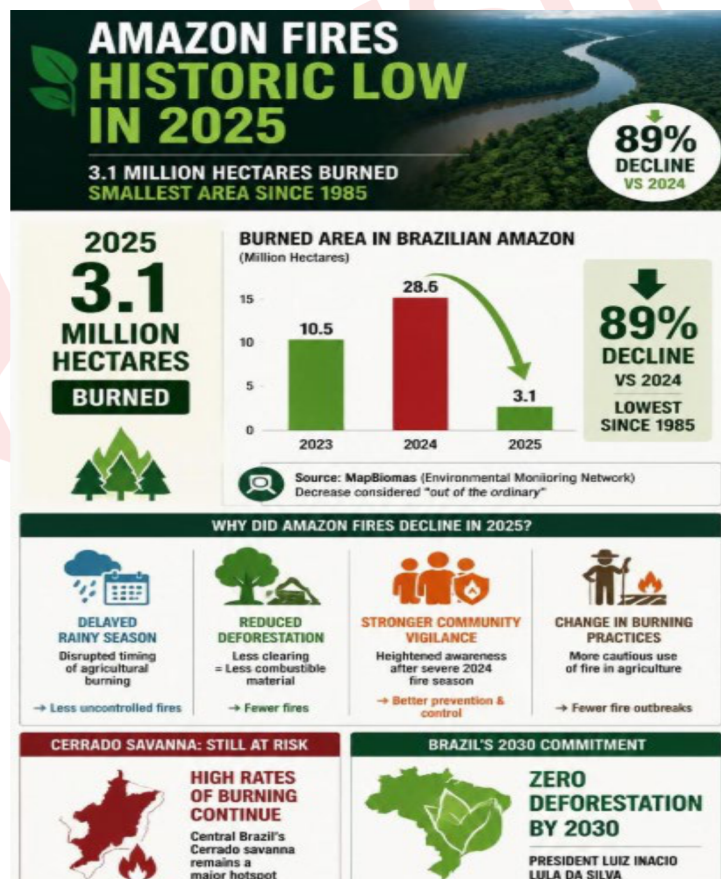
UPSC Fact: *The Amazon is more important as a **carbon sink and water recycler** than as the "Lungs of the Earth."*

Why Did Fires Decline?

- **Reduced deforestation**, lowering combustible biomass.
- **Delayed rainy season**, disrupting agricultural burning.
- **Improved monitoring and conservation efforts**.
- **Greater community awareness** after the severe 2024 fire season.

Challenges

- Continued **illegal logging and agricultural expansion**.
- Increasing **climate change-induced droughts and fires**.
- High fire incidence in the **Cerrado** (Brazil's tropical savanna).
- Risk of crossing the **Amazon Tipping Point**, where **20–25% forest loss** may irreversibly convert large areas into savanna.

2.Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Amendment Bill, 2026

Why in News?

The **Press Information Bureau (PIB)** clarified provisions of the **Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Amendment Bill, 2026** after concerns were raised by minority institutions regarding the proposed '**Designated Authority**' for managing assets created through foreign contributions.

Key Highlights

Purpose	Management of assets created from foreign funds when FCRA registration is suspended, cancelled or not renewed
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Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA)

- **Enacted: 1976** (replaced by the **FCRA, 2010**).
- **Nodal Ministry: Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA)**.
- **Objective:** Regulate the acceptance and utilization of **foreign contributions** to ensure they do not adversely affect **India's sovereignty, integrity, security, public interest, or democratic institutions**.

Key Provisions of the 2026 Amendment Bill

- Establishes a **Designated Authority** to temporarily manage assets created from foreign contributions.
- Applies where an NGO's FCRA registration is **suspended, cancelled, surrendered, or not renewed**.
- The authority has **powers similar to a Civil Court** for management, transfer, or sale of assets.
- **Orders are appealable** before the **District Judge**.
- If FCRA registration is restored, **assets will be returned** to the organisation.
- **Places of worship retain their religious character**; only foreign-funded assets are subject to management.

2026 Rules - Important Changes

- **FCRA registration is valid for 5 years**; renewal must be sought **6 months before expiry**.
- NGOs must demonstrate **reasonable activity** by utilizing at least **₹10 lakh** of foreign contribution during the previous **two financial years**.
- Greater disclosure requirements and stricter compliance norms.

Significance

- Enhances **transparency and accountability** in the utilization of foreign funds.
- Prevents misuse of assets created through foreign contributions.
- Protects public assets while ensuring **judicial review through appeals**.
- Strengthens the regulatory framework governing foreign-funded organisations.

Way Forward

- Ensure **transparent and time-bound implementation** of the new provisions.
- Strengthen safeguards against arbitrary action.
- Balance **national security concerns** with the autonomy of genuine civil society organisations.

3. Teesta Stage-VI Hydroelectric Project

Why in News?

A **suspected methane gas explosion** inside the **Teesta Stage-VI Hydroelectric Project** tunnel in **Sikkim** killed **15 workers**. An earlier **NHPC technical paper (EUROENGEO 2024)** had already documented repeated incidents of **flammable gas and tunnel fires** at the project site.

About Teesta Stage-VI Project

- **500 MW Run-of-the-River (RoR)** hydropower project on the **Teesta River**.
- Originally allotted to **Lanco Teesta Hydro Power Ltd.** and later acquired by **NHPC** under the **Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC)** in **2019**.
- Sikkim receives **12% free power** for the first 15 years and **15% thereafter** as royalty.

Why are Himalayan Tunnels Vulnerable?

- Young and **geologically unstable Himalayan mountains**.
- Presence of **fractured rocks** such as **quartzite and carbon-rich phyllite**.
- Emission of **methane gas** from rock strata during tunnelling.
- Located in **Seismic Zone IV**, making tunnels prone to collapses and geological surprises.

Prelims Fact: Methane becomes explosive when its concentration exceeds the Lower Explosive Limit (LEL) of about 5% in air.

Concerns

- Worker safety due to **flammable gases and tunnel collapses**.
- Inadequate geological risk assessment and monitoring.
- Challenges in rescue operations due to **toxic gases and confined tunnels**.
- Fragile Himalayan ecology and seismic vulnerability affecting infrastructure projects.

Way Forward

- Strengthen **geological investigations** before tunnel excavation.
- Install **real-time methane and toxic gas monitoring systems**.

- Adopt international standards for **mine and tunnel safety**.
- Enhance disaster preparedness and emergency response mechanisms in Himalayan infrastructure projects.

4.Nuclear Energy Mission (NEM) for Viksit Bharat

Why in News?

In a reply to a **Parliament Question**, the Government highlighted the progress of the **Nuclear Energy Mission (NEM)**, which aims to achieve **100 GWe of nuclear power capacity by 2047** and accelerate the deployment of **indigenous Small Modular Reactors (SMRs)**.

Key Highlights

Key Features of the Mission

- Target to operationalize **at least five indigenous Small Modular Reactors (SMRs)** by **2033**.
- **SHANTI Act, 2025** provides the legislative framework for expansion of the nuclear sector.
- Enables participation of **Public Sector Enterprises (PSEs), State Governments and Private Sector**.
- **NPCIL** will develop **32 GWe** beyond 2032, while the remaining capacity will come through other implementation models.

Indigenous Small Modular Reactors (SMRs)

SMR	Capacity	Purpose
BSMR-200	220 MWe	Pressurized Water Reactor (PWR)
SMR-55	55 MWe	Pressurized Water Reactor (PWR)
HTGCR	Up to 5 MWth	Hydrogen production through nuclear heat

Proposed Sites: Tarapur (Maharashtra) for **BSMR-200 & SMR-55**; **BARC, Vizag** for **HTGCR**.

Significance

- Enhances **India's energy security** and reduces dependence on fossil fuels.
- Supports the **Net Zero 2070** target through clean baseload power.
- Promotes **indigenous nuclear technology** and innovation.
- Facilitates **green hydrogen production** using nuclear heat.
- Encourages **private sector participation** in nuclear energy.

Safety & Regulatory Framework

- **Atomic Energy Regulatory Board (AERB)** functions as the independent regulator under the **SHANTI Act, 2025**.
- Radioactive waste is managed under the **Atomic Energy (Safe Disposal of Radioactive Wastes) Rules, 1987**.
- Nuclear safety remains a priority from **site selection to plant operation**.

Way Forward

- Accelerate deployment of indigenous **SMRs**.
- Strengthen domestic manufacturing and nuclear supply chains.
- Expand public-private partnerships.
- Maintain robust safety, security and waste management standards.

5.Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) & Overuse of 'Watch' Antibiotics in India

Why in News?

A study published in **The Lancet Public Health** found that **India is overusing 'Watch' antibiotics**, increasing the risk of **Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)**. The study called for greater use of first-line '**Access**' antibiotics and stricter stewardship.

Key Highlights

Particular	Details
Study	<i>The Lancet Public Health</i>
India's Antibiotic Consumption	18.3 DID (Defined Daily Doses per 1,000 people/day)
Ideal Requirement	14.7 DID
Access Antibiotics	27% of total use (Ideal: 52.3%)

WHO AWaRe Classification of Antibiotics

Category	Purpose
Access	First-line antibiotics for common infections; should be widely available and preferred.
Watch	Broad-spectrum antibiotics with higher risk of developing resistance; use should be restricted.
Reserve	Last-resort antibiotics for multidrug-resistant (MDR) infections.

Key Concerns

- Excessive use of '**Watch**' antibiotics accelerates **Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)**.
- Only **6%** of prescriptions were based on **microbiological evidence**.
- High use of antibiotics for **prophylaxis** rather than treatment.
- Irrational prescribing, duplicate antibiotic coverage and overuse of injectable antibiotics.

Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR)

- AMR** occurs when **bacteria, viruses, fungi and parasites** become resistant to antimicrobial medicines.
- Leads to prolonged illness, treatment failure, increased healthcare costs and higher mortality.
- Recognized as a major **One Health** challenge affecting **human, animal and environmental health**.

Government Initiatives

- National Action Plan on AMR (NAP-AMR) 2025-2029** based on the **One Health** approach.

- **ICMR AMR Surveillance Network** for monitoring resistance patterns.
- **National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC)** antimicrobial surveillance.
- Promotion of **Antimicrobial Stewardship (AMS)** programmes in hospitals.

Way Forward

- Promote rational prescription of **Access antibiotics**.
- Strengthen **Antimicrobial Stewardship (AMS)** and microbiological testing.
- Regulate over-the-counter sale of antibiotics.
- Enhance public awareness and surveillance under the **One Health** framework.
